Tips to Follow

- → *Categorise arguments* into different aspects e.g. economically, culturally, socially, health-wise
- → Other possible explanations include comfort, style, change in lifestyle, convenience, affordability, celebrity endorsement effect, etc.
- → Examples of out of scope ideas include the future of this trend and in depth analysis of the pros of living a healthy life

3. Use PEE structure

- → **Point** generalize your argument clearly in the topic sentence
- → **Evidence** give examples to support your point
- **Explanation** state clearly the reasons and consequences (why your point is correct)

Write an article on whether social networking would cause bullying.


Does Social Networking Cause Bullying?

Ever since *the rise of* social networking sites as one of the main ways for people of all ages to interact, they have been used for bad as well as good ends. Social networking sites have been used to bring people from all over the world together, allowing them to stay in contact when they are physically distant. On the other hand, they have been used to *ridicule* and make fun of people online, in an arena where authority figures like teachers and parents are unable to stop bullying. So, to what extent does social networking bring about bullying?

There is *a strong case* for this argument that social networking is a vehicle for bullying, especially in young people. Cyber-bullying means that children who are bullied cannot feel safe or happy even when they are at home. Online forums like Facebook mean that people may still feel nervous and worried about other people making mean comments online. Furthermore, having an online profile makes people nervous about their social groups. It forces you to be worried if your friends list is not long enough or does not have the right people in it. Online profiles also make people self-conscious, as they have to constantly maintain their image and worry about their online presence in order to keep up with cool trends or remain friends with the right people. What social networking sites produce is another place where people can feel left out or unpopular.

Conversely, these negative aspects in the use of social networking sites are not really caused by social networking itself. Bullies do indeed find a place to carry out their evil in these sites, but social networking only provides a convenient place in which to do it. The existence of bullying must be **attributed** to other factors, and it is born in the classroom and the playground. Schools frequently record incidents where students get bullied because they are unpopular with the "cool kids", and bullies often get their arrogance through peer encouragement. If already we could foster better relationships between young people with mutual respect and care when they are still young, this will allow for a much better outcome in the long term. Only the shift in attitudes will cause young people to grow up without treating each other badly.

It is clear that bullying is a phenomenon which could happen through several media. As such, it is important to emphasise that we should not ban or try to get young people to cut down on using social networking, as it does not inherently cause bullying. We should tackle bullying at its **root cause** – the interpersonal level.

- 2. Keep an informal tone
- → Write in a *friendly and disarming manner*.
- → Use phrasal verbs, colloquialisms and informal connectors.
- → Contractions are accepted but, as always, avoid overdoing it.
- 3. Make your blog clear and interesting
- → Give a good, eye-catching title
- → Use interesting examples
- → Refer to *popular culture*
 - References to topical issues, popular musicians and common pastimes.
- → Use humor
 - Adding jokes or humour will help your reader stay focused and interested.
- 4. Interact with your readers
- → Refer to other blog posts
 - You can talk about other blog posts you have read, or refer back to blog posts you have written previously.
- → Invite readers to **follow your blog** at the end.

Tips to Follow

- 1. Start right away
- → Do not make your reader wait
 - At the beginning of your review, say the name of the book/film and the author / filmmaker.
- → Give your opinion at the start
 - You do not have to wait until the end of the review to say what you think of the book / film. You can do that right at the start.
 - Give your readers a general idea of whether you enjoyed it or not.
- 2. Do not give away the ending
- → When you are summarising the plot, you should only choose key details.
- → **Do not talk about** anything that happens in the last third of the book / film.
- 3. Give specifics
- **Refer to specific scenes** or aspects of the book / film that you enjoyed or did not enjoy.
- → Do not just say "the romantic scenes were nice".
- → Usually in an exam question, details about the book / film are not given. Make them up!
- 4. Choice of words
- → Use positive / negative adjectives
- → *Use* some *technical vocabulary* (literary / filmmaking jargons)
- → Use appropriate connectors

Write a book review on *The Witches* by Roald Dahl.

Book Review - The Witches by Roald Dahl

Children's author Roald Dahl firmly established himself as one of the most *imaginative writers* of recent times through books such as *James and the Giant Peach* and *Danny, The Champion of the World*. But it's his grisly and amusing 1983 story *The Witches*, *superbly illustrated* by Quentin Blake, that is the jewel in the crown of his illustrious writing career.

The tale begins with the unnamed narrator being orphaned through the tragic death of his parents. According to their wishes, he takes up residence with his Norwegian grandmother and the pair moves to England for the boy's education. But antics in a hotel in Bournemouth soon eclipse anything the English school system can provide. The narrator, warned by his grandmother of a suspicious breed of witches disguised as upstanding, middle-class ladies, gets more than he bargained for when he discovers a plot to wipe out the entire population of English children by transforming them into mice. Unwittingly finding himself at the annual convention of England's witches, the narrator gets a sneak preview of the demonic intentions of the Grand High Witch, as fellow hotel guest Bruno Jenkins is transformed into vermin before his very eyes. Bruno, in many ways a spoilt child, forms an alliance with the narrator and his grandmother and the trio vow to take on the witches and put paid to their evil scheming.

Dahl is to be **congratulated**, as always, on his **boundless capacity for flights of imagination**. Not many writers would get away with a cast of Norwegian grandmothers, talking mice and half-womanly, half-devilish creatures. But where Dahl really stands out is his ability to make the serious comic, and the comic serious. After all, his plot deals with the death of parents, as well as **a thoroughly uncharitable plot** to exterminate children. But somehow, Dahl forces us to laugh at these sinister events, whilst also asking us to **reflect more somberly on vices** such as greed and selfishness. Such an achievement is no mean feat.

Of course, *the book has its flaws too*. The fact that the hero is a small boy, whilst the villains are middle-aged women is sure to give feminists something to complain about. And it could be argued that the plot is too contrived: how likely is it that the boy and his grandmother would really find themselves in the same hotel as the Grand High Witch? Nevertheless, these minor detractions do not stop the book being one of the most entertaining in modern children's literature.

Fans of Roald Dahl will no doubt enjoy reading *The Witches*, but even those who are not **seasoned lovers** of his books, or of books in general, would find it highly entertaining. In the opinion of this critic, it's well worth a read.

Tips to Follow

- 1. Greet your audience
- → It is important to recognize who you are talking to. You might be addressing your fellow classmates, teachers, or even the principal.
- → Keep your points short and simple. Get to your points as soon as possible. Do not let your audience fall asleep before you have begun.
- 2. Make your position clear
- → *State* which *side of the motion* you are defending right at the start. Your readers do not want to wait for you to be halfway through your speech before they are aware of your position.
- → In this case, supporting the motion means you think this policy should be abolished.
- → Maintain a *consistent stance* throughout your speech.
- 3. Make your speech persuasive
- → Words like 'for' and 'since' add persuasive power to your arguments
- → Use Point Evidence Example (PEE) format
 - Point what is your main argument?
 - Evidence what example can you use to support the argument?
 - Explanation what is the link between the point and the evidence?
- → Add adverbs to emphasise your points
- 4. Write a strong conclusion
- → Summarise your arguments in a *short but powerful sentence* at the end.
- 5. Remember that it is a team effort instead of an individual speech
- → Use 'We' instead of 'I'





2018 DSE Q.5 Sample Essay

Opening

Good afternoon everyone. ① We are here today to debate whether the policy of reporting students' class position should be abolished. ② I strongly support this motion for a number of compelling reasons, and I am sure that by the end of this speech you will too.

- ① State the purpose of debate and rephrase your question.
- (2) Clearly state your stance.

Body Paragraph 1 – Argument #1

- (3) First of all, school grades are clearly a private matter. It is my belief that academic results should be treated like phone numbers or bank details.
 (4) Students should be able to choose when and how they share this information, if they choose to share it at all. After all, only our own grades matter to us, not anybody else's. Although we might be curious about how our classmates have done, it is up to them to tell us if they want to. (5) In this way, those who want to share their results can do so, and those who would rather not don't have to. This is a win-win situation.
- 3 State a clear *topic sentence* to tell readers what you are going to talk about.
- 4 Explanation on how the evidence support your stance (bank details are suitably compared with grades in terms of privacy).
- (5) *A small conclusion* at the end of each body paragraph reminds the audience on the points you have mentioned.

Body Paragraph 2 – Argument #2

However, as well as violating personal privacy, reporting students' class positions can also be disastrous for mental health. (6) As we all know, students in Hong Kong are under a lot of pressure, with tutorial classes and extracurricular activities every day and high expectations from teachers and parents. Knowing that you will be ranked and that your results will immediately be compared with everyone else's adds an unnecessary layer of pressure. This can lead to stress, anxiety or even suicide among young people who are struggling to cope as it is. (7) Why would we not support a measure which could reduce the pressure that teens feel? Abolishing this practice is just common sense.

6 *Use real life illustrations* to support you points – your essay will sound more grounded and persuasive.

(7) Use rhetorical questions to emphasize your points and to leave audience with room to think.

Body Paragraph 3 – Rebuttal

- (8) Some people may argue that reporting results in this way encourages competitiveness among students and leads them to work hard and achieve their very best. It is true that students may want to perform better in order to get a better ranking, but this kind of competitiveness easily leads to bullying and abuse.

 (9) For example, students who have a low overall position may be mocked by their classmates when the results are published. What's more, students who have a high ranking may start to feel like they are better than everyone else and look down on their classmates. There is a dark side to competitiveness, and it seems obvious to me that making students' class positions public encourages all sorts of negative behaviour.
- (8) Mention possible counter arguments and refute them.
- Use anecdotes or personal experience to support your stance (i.e. "improvement through competition" is less important than students' mental health).

Conclusion

In conclusion, reporting students' class positions is an outdated practice which makes private information public, increases the amount of pressure on students, and leads to bullying and bad attitudes among students. There is no doubt in my mind that it should be abolished so that students can be happier, healthier and more in control of their personal information. Thank you for listening.

Imagine a man named Li, who is down on his luck because he has lost his job and his house. He is miserable most of the time and the only thing that makes him feel better is heavy drinking. He hates himself, he hates living on the cold, lonely streets, and he hates that what little money he has goes to buy alcohol. *Now I ask you*, ladies and gentlemen and our dear opponent, which should be cheaper for Li? It is difficult to deny that if taxes on alcohol and cigarettes were raised, the government would have more money to rescue, resolve and rejuvenate the lives of the thousands trapped in a pit of alcoholism and smoking addiction. Not only would the government be able to reinvest the taxes to turn Li's life from a dead end to a road to recovery, they could use the extra money to improve life for everyone.

The keystone of this argument is that all the extra funds would come from two of the most harmful substances available legally, substances that can lead people to destruction because they are available so cheaply. Firstly, raising taxes would generate more money for public services, and secondly it would reduce the supply of harmful substances to our most vulnerable citizens.

It is likely, ladies and gentlemen, that today you will hear opposition from two different camps. The first will try to convince you that to rob a man of the pleasures of drinking will reinforce the divide between rich and poor. The second will put forward that the government will not use the tax money for social good. Let me tell you that *I wholeheartedly believe in this motion*, and that these points of opposition are *speculative, fear-mongering and ignorant*. The first is ignorant in its assumption that we need alcohol as a society, its assumption that these harmful substances are a basic human right. You have received an email from your friend Jane. She is asking for tips as she is preparing for a job interview. Try to give some advice on how to act confident and capable in an interview, as well as how to prepare beforehand. Sign your name Alex.

Hi Jane,

It's great to hear from you. Congratulations on your interview at Cathay Pacific! I'm glad to hear you are making a good start in your job hunt. I think I can offer a few tips to help you out in getting the job.

First of all, it is important to be confident in your abilities! You are a very strong candidate and being able to recognise this will show Cathay Pacific that you will be a self-assured and motivated employee. Projecting a strong and confident personality is an important part of engaging your interviewer and being able to show your strengths rather than concentrate too much on your weaknesses. If you *let your nervousness take over* the interview, you won't be able to show the interviewers what you really can do. But don't go overboard. Be polite to your interviewers and be modest about your achievements. *Don't show off or lapse into arrogance*. Employers will be put off if you over-estimate your abilities or over-exaggerate your achievements.

A good way to prepare for interviews is to try to anticipate what the interviewers are going to ask you. If you know what types of question to expect, you can think of answers to the questions beforehand. You will have to think on your feet in the interview, but if you prepare rough answers, you can mould them for different purposes in the interview. For example, the interviewers will probably ask you about your past work experience, so be ready to talk about the responsibilities that you had in your job at Pluto Marketing. It is useful to think about what you might say if the interviewers ask about your strengths and weaknesses in that job, and how you could improve on your performance at work. Another useful thing to do before the interview is to research on the company. You will **prove your seriousness and dedication** if you are able to show that you have learnt about the company and take your application seriously. You could learn something about the history of Cathay Pacific, such as when it was founded.

If you don't get this job, don't take it personally. Many people apply for a number of jobs before they are successful. This is inevitable when there are high levels of competition. I am sure that you will find a job eventually, if you are not successful with Cathay Pacific. Treat the interview as a learning opportunity. The next time you go for a job, you will have better experience of how to perform well in interviews. In terms of applying for future jobs, it is important to be clear and confident about your abilities on your CV. You don't want to risk hiding your amazing achievements behind your lack of confidence!

I'm sure you'll do very well, so don't be discouraged. Keep me posted!

- → Begin each paragraph with a general sentence that introduces your main argument.
- → Choose interesting examples. If you cannot think of any, make them up!

4. Include opposite points

- → You absolutely do not have to present the opposite view in detail, or analyse it in any way. Yet, you should mention it. Then *knock it down*.
- → Show that you appreciate other people have different opinions about this issue. In particular, if you are writing in response to an article, say if you agree or disagree with the journalist.

I am writing *in support* of the government's decision to include traditional egg tarts and Mahjong in their list of intangible cultural heritage items that the city should protect. I would like to discuss why they are worth protecting and how they can be protected.

First of all, traditional egg tarts have been *at the heart of* Hong Kong cuisine for over 75 years. While platforms like Facebook and Twitter were intended to be a place for rational debate and logic, nowadays they are dominated by anger, abuse and hatred. As a result, ②I believe that these platforms stifle rather than encourage public debate.

Users just shout other people down rather than engaging in a real debate. On top of this, ⑤users can post anonymously, which makes this problem even worse because there are no consequences to people being rude or abusive online.

One consequence of this is that debates are very shallow rather than having nuance or depth. People can just post quick opinions without any evidence. Clearly, this lowers

the quality of public debate rather than encouraging people to be *rational and thoughtful*.

However, the reality is that people on social media usually socialise in circles of similar faiths and beliefs, thus they are surrounded by others who often share the same opinions as them. Rather than having polite debates with people who have opposing views, users just have their own opinions confirmed and do not think about any other arguments. Consequently, they think that they are right about everything and cannot handle it when people disagree with them.

Real debate is stifled and divisions in society become more entrenched.

Mock Question and Answer

You are a member of the debating club in your school. The club is inviting opinions on whether keeping animals in captivity, zoos and safari parks, is a positive thing. Write a one-sided argumentative essay which will be posted on the website of the club. State and justify your position in the essay.

Set the Animals Free!

Keeping animals in captivity is always wrong. Zoos and safari parks, although billed as an ethical form of conservation and education, are no different from circuses and shows in terms of their physical and mental effect on the animals involved – they are all principally concerned with entertainment. In this essay I will argue that keeping animals in zoos and safari parks are *morally indefensible*.

Keeping animals in captivity is often *defended on the grounds of* providing a source of education and a centre of conservation. Zoos and safari parks' principle source of revenue, however, is from visitors. Their chief concern is with attracting visitors in order to meet their overhead costs and make a profit. The fact that their main concern is making money means that they cannot be principally concerned with the animals that they claim to conserve and educate people about. They are not hospitals or sanctuaries, but commercial businesses. This concern with money means that animals are not protected equally. It is always profitable to keep a lion, for example, because it attracts crowds, but such establishments are less willing to spend money protecting rare insects or fauna. Zoos and safari parks cannot be defended on the grounds that they put forward, therefore.

Indeed, this concern with money **breeds unethical practices**. Baby animals often attract larger crowds than grown animals do, for example. The money-making potential of baby animals means that zoos and parks often force animals to mate and take their offspring away from them at a very young age. This is distressing for the animals but as the desired effect on the mature adults – it allows them to breed successfully again more quickly. The result is that the zoo or park is again 'blessed' with babies to bring in the crowd. This treatment is distressing and inhumane. It is, however, practised by zoos and parks.

Of course, some people have defended keeping animals in captivity on the Realpolitik grounds that animals are not equal to people. That is to say, animals have no rights because I do not *envisage* any relationship between myself and the animals, thus I have no obligations to them. Take this person's pet dog or cat away, however, and the tune becomes very different. Anyone with a pet will know that animals do feel emotion. To claim that we do not have an obligation towards their welfare, and that we are justified in keeping them in captivity because we want to, is simply outrageous. Zoos and parks simply cannot be defended on these grounds.

Indeed, there are better ways to *educate and conserve* animals than keeping them in captivity. Detaining animals behind bars does allow them to breed and allow the opportunity to study them, but it also costs a lot. There are more effective ways of achieving these goals and investing money than into these parks, most notably of which is investment into charities that aim to maintain animal populations in situ. That is to say, they aim to protect animals in their natural environment rather than removing them for public display. In the past this has been far more successful than putting animals into captivity. For example, very few animal populations are re-released into the wild once put into captivity, in comparison, programmes that protect animals in their environments boast a much more impressive success rate. We ought to consider the different ways in which we can help animals other than the options offered by captivity.

Zoos and parks are *undoubtedly* entertaining; however, there are better ways to achieve the noble aims of these institutions. Protecting animals does not mean putting them behind bars. This has been shown to have a negative impact on their physical and mental health. It is a business that aims to entertain more than anything else. Instead we ought to *focus on the alternatives*, particularly preserving animals in situ.

Write a report to explain why this is happening and to suggest what could be done to increase the number of moviegoers. Give reasons to support your suggestions.

Dealing with Low Attendance at Cinemas

Watching a film at the cinema is becoming a *decreasingly popular* leisure activity. This report considers the reasons for this trend, and outlines suggestions for how to encourage more people to go to the cinema.

Why Don't People Attend Cinemas?

The key reason for decreasing attendance at local cinemas is the low budget and easy availability of films online. There are both legal and illegal avenues for watching films on the internet. Illegally, people can easily watch brand new releases for free from the comfort of their own home. There are also legal websites on which people can pay to view new films, or simply wait for films to become available on subscription websites such as Netflix. For these people, it is *cheaper and more convenient* to wait for films to become available online, rather than going out to the cinema.

Solution 1: Cheaper Cinema Tickets

In order to encourage people to go to their local cinema, cinemas need to recognise consumers' desire for an experience that is value for money. As cinemas are finding it difficult to reduce the prices of tickets due to falling custom, local governments or even charities might decide to **subsidise** ticket prices, in order to avoid the closure of local cinemas. Another option for cinemas would be to implement a policy of free cinema tickets, with moviegoers encouraged to spend money on 'extras', such as premium seats, snacks and drinks. The result would be to draw huge crowds of people to the cinema with the free tickets, allowing the cinema to make a profit on the **extra perks** that people choose to purchase.

Solution 2: Enhanced Cinema Experience

Another solution to this problem would be to make the experience of cinema *more luxurious and multifaceted*, so that people no longer see cinema simply as a more expensive and inconvenient version of Netflix. Rather than offering the tired options of popcorn and fizzy drinks, cinemas could focus on providing *gourmet snacks and even meals* for people to enjoy before or during the film. They could make use of new technology to enhance the cinema-going experience, such as *kinetic seats* and *IMAX dome screens*. Thus, rather than just being an over-sized television or laptop screen, the cinema would become a worthwhile experience, which people would be happy to leave their houses and spend money on.

Conclusion

Advances on the Internet and personal technology have *contributed to the downfall* of the local cinema. Local cinemas need to act quickly in order to survive. They might consider cheaper or free cinema tickets, and creating an enhanced cinema experience, to *entice* more customers through their doors.

- 2 **Include scene-setting details** (i.e. time, place and characters)
 - → Lots of (seemingly) insignificant details help to establish the scene.
 - → E.g. It was night-time when I heard the news. I remember because my clock read 23:58. I looked out of the window and saw a group of youths in baseball caps throwing a basketball around.
 - → If there is a mystery element to your story, plot details such as the above can serve as breadcrumbs for your readers to follow.
- 3 Use of *Foreboding*
 - → Seemingly insignificant items or lines of dialogue can be "planted" at the beginning.
 - → E.g. 'Why do I feel like you would be the end of me?' Mr. Smith stared at me.
 - → If it turns out that "Mr. Smith" would get into trouble because of "me", this line will later take on a new meaning.
- 4. Include more structural and lexical variations in your story
 - → Vary your sentence structures (using a mix of long and short sentences)
 - Long sentences are used to show the slower passage of time, or that the action is relaxing, e.g. Our movements flowed with a dazzling grace that took away the breath of every person in the audience. We could feel our souls becoming one with the music as we unleashed our inner artist.
 - Short sentences are used for action lines and dramatic scenes, e.g. 'The winner is...6B!'I froze. Then my heart sank. How could it be? The only possible explanation is...I glanced at the adjudicators, and my worst fear was confirmed.

Article – "Poverty in Hong Kong" – By Mandy Ma (F5)

Write an article entitled "Poverty in Hong Kong". Give reasons for the problem of poverty in Hong Kong, and suggest various ways in which the government and charities can help poor people.

Poverty in Hong Kong

Residents in subdivided flats, beggars and vagrants draw our attention to the serious problem of poverty in Hong Kong. *It is lamentable to find that* there is *a mounting number* of people living below the poverty line and that the disparity between the rich and the poor is enlarging. Research has revealed that one fifth of Hongkongers are living in poverty, *for which this article aims to provide an explanation*, as well as ways for the government and charities to make the poor's lives less miserable.

One of the reasons for the high poverty rate is inflation. The prices of properties, as well as daily necessities, have been skyrocketing that people's wages simply could not catch up with. According to the Census and Statistics Department, Hong Kong's Gini coefficient index shows a figure of 0.539, the highest we have seen in 45 years. Hong Kong's tax policy with the aim of maintaining a free economy has long caused the poor to become poorer, to the point where their income is inadequate in covering their living expenses, leading to the *exacerbation* of the poverty problem.

Apart from inflation, another factor causing poverty is the lack of government financial support. According to the Hong Kong government's budget, the *annual surplus* in 2017 reached HK\$138 billion. However, there are little welfare programmes for the public, merely the policy of distributing HK\$4000 to selected citizens. Moreover, only people who have not received Comprehensive Social Security Assistance are allowed to receive the money, meaning that the government actually offers close to no help to grassroots groups. Income redistribution is key in combating disparity, and recent government actions (or lack thereof) have shown that they are incapable of solving the problem.

To curb poverty, the government should redevelop hectares of golf courses into more public flats. The housing problem and poverty problem are interrelated in the sense that lower-income groups cannot afford the astonishingly high rents of private housing. If they are able to live in public housing with low rent, they can save plenty of money, mitigating their financial difficulties. However, the average waiting time for public housing per person is 3.3 years. More public housing is needed to shorten the waiting time, and keeping so many hectares of recreational golf courses while sacrificing the right to affordable living for the poor hardly seems logical.

Another way to deal with the problem is to improve social welfare. For instance, the government can lower the age limit of the Old Age Allowance or raise the amount. In terms of education, it can also provide more subsidies for books and study tours, lowering the cost of studying. Charities can help in these efforts by following up with the elderly and students in poverty to make sure they get and effectively use what is provided. Also, financial assistance like tax cuts can be offered to small and medium-sized enterprises to *avoid monopolisation* by large companies. Last but not least, charities can be provided with more supplies more regularly to give to street sleepers, including food, water and blankets.

To conclude, the epidemic that is poverty worsens Hong Kong people's standard of living on average. It demands immediate action from the government. Being in the same community, we are all responsible to voice for the underprivileged groups and *strive for a better, more humane, future*.

Being smart or intelligent may sometimes be defined as whether we can get good grades in school, but it is so much more than that. One should strive to become a multifaceted citizen in the society and possess social awareness and the ability to think critically, which is why *our side vehemently believes that this motion must stand* for the following reasons.

To begin with, watching TV can hone one's language skills. For example, online streaming platforms such as Netflix have become popular not just because of their convenience and accessibility, but also for their wide variety of content. TV shows on such platforms can be enjoyed on-demand, and viewers can choose whichever genres they enjoy watching. For most shows, they can also choose whichever of the two to four languages available to watch in, as well as subtitles that are provided in different languages. With browser add-ons, viewers can even have them shown on screen in two languages at the same time. The flexibility to switch between languages are paramount in assisting language-learners' listening skills, to the extent where for example, I have personally been able to transition from using Chinese and English subtitles for shows to needing no subtitles at all. In addition, conversational and formal expressions are featured in most shows, and watching them can therefore allow us to learn sayings that are unfamiliar to Hongkongers.

Adding to my previous point, watching TV can also broaden our horizons. TV programmes cover many different genres ranging from fictional detective series to documentaries about social issues, history, and nature. The wide array of content gives viewers knowledge and perspectives that school textbooks alone cannot provide. Receiving this information via "moving pictures" is a more direct way to let viewers know what is happening in the world. For example, the National Geographic channel teaches and shows us about wild animals in real time, and Master Chef entertains us with the different levels of cooking amongst the population while also informing us about cookery, making even the average homemaker more capable in their daily tasks. This medium of transferring knowledge, we believe, is more effective than flipping through nature guides and cookbooks, their paperback counterparts.

Our opponents may contend that children and teenagers easily fall into the trap of TV addiction, negatively affecting their intelligence in the long run, but to counter that, TV programmes are also a good way to educate young children. Children are usually interested in colourful animations, and they will pay more attention to TV programmes than books. Research has shown that blending teaching into cartoons is the most efficient way for children to learn. Children tend to understand and absorb more from TV animation than textbooks, which shows that TV can help children learn more effectively. As with other forms of entertainment, parental and teacher guidance should suffice in offsetting the risks of overindulgence.

In conclusion, watching TV can help both adults and children to be smarter in different ways, due to their language assist features and its technological capability over textbooks. Therefore, this motion must stand. Thank you.

It has recently been reported that some parents in Asian countries are installing apps on their children's mobile phones that monitor their activities to ensure they use these devices responsibly. Dear Editor,

I was disgusted, but unfortunately not surprised, to read in your last issue that some parents have been installing monitoring apps on their children's phones. This is just the latest development in the phenomenon of 'helicopter parenting', and it is time we *acknowledged its dangers* for the victims: the children.

One of the biggest dangers of helicopter parenting is that it stops children taking responsibility for their own actions. In this age of constant technological advancement, it is more important than ever to encourage independent but responsible use of technology. If a child is given the independence to use their own phone responsibly, they learn how to deal with issues themselves. It might feel daunting for parents to deliberately expose their children to the risks of using a mobile phone, but it is actually a crucial part of a child's development. By facing problems, young people build resilience, which is central to their mental health later in life. Parents constantly watching their children will create a vulnerable and anxious generation who are unable to cope with the smallest obstacle.

Another danger with this spying phenomenon is that it could break down the relationship of trust and openness between child and parent. If a child is constantly watched, they might crave privacy in other areas of their life, and therefore engage in secretive and risky behaviour, just so that they can have a life outside of their parents' watchful eyes. Thus, constant surveillance of your child could actually be *counter-productive*, as it could bring about a relationship in which children don't want to share problems with their parents. This is a common risk when children reach adolescence and start to *crave independence* from their ever-present parents.

The final reason why I disagree with this practice is that there are many other, less intrusive ways to monitor a child's activities on their mobile phone. Parents could give them a non-smartphone, limiting their access to the internet. If a child does have *internet access* on their phones, parents can easily install a child blocker on the browser, which is a less interfering method of stopping children accessing unsafe websites. However, in my view, the best advice of all is to create a communicative and open relationship with one's child: discuss what your child is doing on their phones, and educate them about how to stay safe when using a mobile phone. Encouraging communication would make children more likely to go to their parents for help if they had problems which they could not handle by themselves. This approach would also make children more receptive to advice about their mobile phones, since they would not be having it *rammed down their throats* with constant surveillance and nagging.

Parents have always been concerned when their children are dealing with a trend which they did not have when they were young: right now, it is mobile phones. However, parents **must not let this fear get in the way of** fostering a trusting and communicative relationship with their children. Spying is **certainly not the means to this end**.

Fire Burnt Down the Final Game

28th June, 2020

It was a calm day in the Millennium Stadium of Royal College. Large crowds were lining up at the entrance for the historical soccer match between the two most competitive schools -- St. George's School and Royal College. St. George's School had been a 3-time *consecutive champion*, but Royal College acquired new bloods and was *a dark horse* throughout the season. Both schools got talented footballers, while St. George's School had a better chemistry, Royal College was superior in its defensive plays. The score had been close since the start of the game. When St. George's School started off with a long-distance shot, the crowd *went hyped* while the opposing fans *were in despair*. Within 10 minutes, the midfielder of Royal College scored as *a payback*. The fascinating goal left the whole stadium *in utter silence*, even a pin dropping on the floor could be heard. During the last 10 minutes, the score was tied at 3-3, an overtime session was likely to happen.

The football match was in great tension when audience from the front row started to scream. It was found out that some youngsters intended to smoke and were about to light a cigarette when the lighter dropped on the floor. Unfortunately, it lit some piles of newspapers and posters on the floor. These materials were easily flammable. Soon, the front bench was *burning in ferocious flames*. 'People should be instructed to leave orderly and calmly,' said a student from St. George's School. The captain of Royal College was a bit disappointed with the match results. However, he still believed safety was the most important. He hoped that all the fans were safe and no accidents like this would occur again.

This incident taught people a lesson they should remain rational during emergency and put safety as the first priority.

Your essay assignment from your drama teacher is to answer the question: Is Romantic Love Necessary for a Happy Marriage? Write your essay.

Is Romantic Love Necessary for a Happy Marriage?

Across nations and cultures, marriage is seen as a solemn and lifelong commitment into which two romantically linked individuals agree to enter. *That being said*, it does not follow that freely chosen partners will end up happily ever after, nor will arranged marriages necessarily fail. Whether romantic love is necessary for a happy marriage has *caused fierce debate* in society for decades. However, after considering the factors that lead to a happy marriage, *I am strongly convinced that* romantic love is not necessary based on three reasons.

The first reason is that romantic love is usually temporary and cannot last for years. **Studies have shown that** romantic love usually transitions or fades to obligatory love within five years of marriage, meaning that it is common to see couples blindly over-obeying and following their partners' wishes when they start dating. They usually believe that their partners **mean the world to** them and they are perfect. However, this kind of mindset soon turns into them getting tired or annoyed by little faults of their partners, such as picking their nose in front of them, their hair being too long or even the way they talk. People usually do not have the patience to stay perfect in front of someone that they have to face for a long time. In terms of a happy marriage, the couple should feel at least comfortable in front of each other, but if they keep thinking about romance and ignore the true facts, how is the marriage going to last long?

In addition, it is hard for couples bound by romantic love to settle their differences after the romantic phase of their relationship. When they discover that they have differing views on, for example, politics, religion or life goals, most couples avoid discussing these issues and mainly focus on how much they fancy each other and where they are going next. However, once they get married, they eventually have to discuss where their relationship is heading or how many kids they want to have and how they should raise them. Undoubtedly, everyone has a different point of view and might get angry when they hear others opposing them. For couples with romantic love, the consequences can be more serious. As they believe their partner understands everything about them, they are *more prone to* feeling "betrayed". Accordingly, they might find other people who understand them and end up separating.

Some may argue that a marriage without romance sounds impossible to maintain. They contend that sexual longing and infatuation should only be felt between couples, and the culmination of that relationship is marriage. In my opinion, this argument is not sound as the most important factor in a happy marriage is to have trust and understanding between the spouses. I refer back to a previous point that arranged marriages have worked in many cases. Take our grandparents who ended up together decades ago as an example – in a time period where divorce was not a popular option, they have learned to endure each other's flaws and maintained their relationship even if romance was no longer there. As "man and wife" for such a long time, they eventually understood that romance merely provides the spice in a relationship. What is more important is that they believe in each other and understand each other, good or bad. That way, they are still happy to have one another for the remaining time that they have.

From the above, we can see that romantic love, due to its short-lived nature, usually takes another form as time goes on, namely obligatory and familial love. The absence of romantic love does not mean that the relationship is over, and so even if the presence of which can bring two people together in the first place, it is certainly not needed for the long road ahead.

Social Media Platforms Ruin Rational Debate

Nowadays, there have been *rounds of heated debate* on whether social media platforms are supporting debates and logical arguments on different topics. Supporters of this argue that social media allows people living countries apart to talk about *controversial topics*, thus promoting public debate. While others stated debating using social media will finally lead to emotional arguments rather than staying rational. In my opinion, social media stifles public debate.

The main reason opposing this argument is that social media places people with *similar ideologies* together. Social media often have numerous groups. Each group focuses on a different topic. These groups are mostly created by users. If a user creates a group on certain topic, people who are also interested in that topic will join. If a person disliking the subject joins and posts rational reasons against the topic, chances are most will *blindly throw insults and hate*, knowing that the entire group has their back; instead of trying to counter the argument rationally. Other people seeing this will be discouraged from starting a rational debate with one another through social media, leading to people being separated based on their opinions. If people only *associate with like-minded people*, there is no opposition, and no debate will happen on that topic.

Secondly, people debate in social media emotionally rather than rationally. People on social media can **remain anonymous** as long as they do not expose too much of their personal information to be recognized in real life. Knowing this, its users will hardly hold back at all on a comment or a post opposing their ideas. Insults will be thrown to the unfortunate person rapidly, as they know that even if their friends or family saw those hateful words, no one would know it was them. It will not affect their real-life reputation at all. Even if they have a bad reputation on the internet, all of it can be reset by creating a new account. They will have no consequences at all, as no one will be able to confirm the two accounts are used by the same person. This is why people debate in social media emotionally rather than rationally.

Some may say that social media encourages debate among people from different countries, different cultures and therefore with different mindsets. They will be likely to provide a fresh point of view to the topic, thus promoting debate. However, this is not true. *Unpopular opinions* are often ignored in social media. Picture this: in a group, there are 100 people each posting a supporting document on a topic. One person sees this and offers a new point of view that counters most of their arguments. The consequence is either the person gets insulted, or their *comment goes unnoticed*. This is because of how social media works. When someone scrolls down to look at posts of the group, the top posts are determined the number of likes and an unpopular opinion will not be liked by others solely due to different mindsets. Even if *the reasoning is well-constructed* and rational, few people will like the post. This leads to the unpopular opinion not being able to spread. Therefore, social media will not be able to promote debate.

To sum up, social media stifles public debate due to people interacting with *like-minded people*, having no responsibility for what they say and how algorithm works *against the minority*.

Decreasing Trend of Moviegoers: Reasons and Suggestions

For most people, seeing a movie in the cinema used to be an experience **not easily replicable** at home. **In recent years however, some have contended that** the movie theatre no longer adds enough value to this experience to justify the cost. A recent survey by the University of Hong Kong observed that fewer people went to the cinema than before in Hong Kong. It seems that people are more reluctant, but why is this happening?

First of all, the price of movie tickets has risen sharply over the years. Some cinemas charge more than \$100 for a single ticket, it is so expensive that people would rather spend their money on other entertainment. Because of the increasing prices of movie tickets, many middle-class citizens and grassroots cannot afford to go to the cinema anymore. Couple that with the effect that COVID-19 has had on cinemas, *it is no surprise that* fewer people would buy tickets to see movies at the cinema.

Another reason that contributes to the decreasing trend of moviegoers is the rising number of pirated movies. Finding a free (not even necessarily in lower quality) version of a film is nothing more difficult that a simple Google search. With the right antivirus software in place, one can enjoy countless hours of free entertainment in the form of pirated movies. Before the age of the Internet, the government could shut down pirated movie stalls and hawkers easily. But it is now very hard to keep track of these pirated movie distributors because they can operate their illegal business on the Internet. The methods are so accessible that more movie-viewers would rather see pirated movies on the Internet than watching them in the cinemas.

How can we solve this problem? First of all, cinemas can provide all sorts of discounts to customers. For example, they can issue a family discount, which can effectively bring family moviegoers to cinemas in a bundle. They can also make better use of membership systems. Members can earn various discounts and complimentary snacks. *These incentives will* bring down the perceived overall cost of moviegoing, hopefully attracting more people to go to cinemas.

In order to solve the problem of pirated movies, the government should take stronger actions in the form of setting up more laws to *curb movie piracy*. A harsher sentence on offenders (which includes people who simply download such films) can deter them from partaking in this illegal act. To achieve this, the government can also cooperate with search engines to block the pirated movies showing up in the search results. The inconvenience and *deterrent effect* should send more people back to cinemas.

In an era filled with technological advancement and inexpensive shortcuts on the Internet, it is a mission for motion-picture lovers to save the movie industry. It is possible for intellectual property rights to be better protected by the government and actions to increase the number of moviegoers can be systematically taken.

And there this duo turns into a moving, green object, crawling towards the grass. They move slowly, trying their hardest to prevent any noise, and from grabbing the tiger's attention. They walk into the pit of bushes, and hardly you could hear a sizzling noise coming out from the 'greenery', where the duo successfully blends themselves into the heap of green. The action is done in dead silence, shadowed by the tiger's heavy breath. Without anyone noticing, the duo sneaks their way past the tiger, with the tiger still boasting about his imaginary victory, not sensing the furtiveness beside him. Behind the tiger is only 100 metres away from the promised land, and for the sneaky duo, it is a no man's land for them to sprint towards their victory. From the grass, they could barely hear the tiger gritting its teeth for his delivered meal, and under the contestants' scream and sharp piercing cry, the race ended out of everyone's expectations. As the referee blasts his air horn once again signalling the end of the race, the duo wins. The tiger is in absolute shock, followed by an earth-shaking growl, but everything's too late, as the duo steps onto the podium, claiming their well-deserved yet controversial triumph.
